Funds under this award are to be used to complete work outlined in the attached Work Plan and completed SF-424 forms. The Service Project Officer (i.e., Partners Program Biologist) identified in the Project Contacts section of this letter will be substantially involved in this project including, but not limited to: (A) participating and collaborating with you and other project partners, in carrying out the Work Plan; (B) reviewing and approving each stage of work; and (C) closely monitoring or otherwise providing operational involvement during the project.

Full compliance with environmental laws is not yet complete for this project. Project planning and coordination tasks can proceed; however, no ground-disturbing work or project implementation actions can occur until Service has notified you in writing that project

implementation work can begin. The Partners Program Biologist will assist you with completion of the Federal compliance processes; however, recipients of Federal funds are ultimately responsible for ensuring that all applicable Federal, State, and local permits are obtained for work performed under this Cooperative Agreement.

Habitat Retention Period:

The habitat retention period is distinct from the performance period. It is defined as the period during which the landowner must allow the habitat restored under this award to remain in place without interference. The habitat retention period ends on September 30, 2027.

Performance Period:

The performance period of this award is August 15, 2017 through September 30, 2022. Only allowable costs resulting from obligations incurred during the performance period may be charged to this award. All obligations incurred under the award must be liquidated no later than 90 calendar days after the end of the performance period, unless the Service approves a final financial reporting period extension (see Reporting Requirements section below). If you need more time to complete project activities, you must submit a written request to the Partners Program Biologist identified in the Project Contacts section below at least 10 calendar days before the end of the stated performance period (see Project/Program Plan and Budget Revisions section below).

Indirect Costs:

Cooperator is authorized to charge only a flat indirect cost rate of 10% of the Modified Total Direct Costs (MTDC) for the life of this award, including any subsequent revisions and extensions for time, regardless of any indirect cost rate the Cooperator may establish with the Federal government during the award period. WORK PLAN

The conservation project described below is agreed to by the Service, and the Northwest California Resource Conservation and Development Council.

Description of Project and Objectives:

Introduction and Project Justification

This project will remove the dilapidated East Weaver Dam (EWD), a diversion dam located on East Weaver Creek, an anadromous fish-bearing tributary to Weaver Creek and the Trinity River. The East Weaver Creek watershed encompasses 8,300 acres and represents ~25% of the Weaver Creek watershed. The upper 30% of the watershed is within the Trinity Alps Wilderness and the EWD is located ~0.5 miles downstream of the Wilderness boundary.

This project is a collaboration between the Five Counties Salmonid Conservation Program (a program of the nonprofit Northwest California Resource Conservation and Development Council), the Weaverville Community Services District, and the Service's Partners for Fish and Wildlife Program.

The EWD is an integral part of the community of Weaverville's water supply, supplying the majority of water to the community throughout most of the year. While integral to the community, the dam is a migration barrier to threatened coho salmon and other migrating anadromous fish species (steelhead, Pacific lamprey) and resident trout. The EWD is the only complete migration barrier on East Weaver Creek and the dam is in poor condition and will require repairs that may be hindered until fish passage is addressed.

The project will remove the EWD, restoring fish passage to 2.5 miles of high quality upstream spawning and rearing habitat and restoring the natural sediment and bedload routing function of the stream. The project also includes relocating the water intake for the East Weaver Water Treatment Facility, assuring a reliable water supply to the community of Weaverville California.

Project Work Plan

Removal of the dam will occur in a series of phases and rely on natural channel forming processes over time. The phases include (1) relocating the intake structure 270 feet upstream of the dam crest; (2) remove a portion of the dam; (3) Monitoring channel elevations and sediment deposition in both the upstream and downstream directions to assess adjustment; (4) Adjust channel in upstream and downstream reaches as necessary based on monitoring; (5) Remove all remaining portions of the dam structure; and (6) repeat channel monitoring and make channel adjustments as necessary to maintain design channel grade and ensure fish passage conditions.

Special Conditions and Provisions:

- **A.** <u>Joint Obligations:</u> The Service and the Northwest California Resource Conservation and Development Council shall work cooperatively with other partners, as applicable, in further developing the conservation project(s) of this agreement. Further, each shall:
 - 1. Provide, as appropriate, biological and technical advice in project planning, design, implementation, monitoring, and maintenance of funded projects. Designate acceptable local "onsite" Project Field Manager(s) for the project. The Project Field Manager(s) will be responsible for properly implementing and monitoring all project activities.

- 2. Develop work plans with the property owners for each project. Plans will include, as appropriate, summaries of work to be performed (e.g., specific planting and spraying prescriptions, etc.), timeframes for implementation and continued management of work, and short- and long-term management/maintenance practices to be conducted.
- 3. Jointly determine which appropriate guidelines for the design and implementation phases of the project(s). Implementation activities will be conducted in a manner that will minimize any negative effects to fish and wildlife resources.
- 4. Jointly prepare a project summary report for the project as outlined in the reporting requirements section.

B. Service will:

- 1. Insure that the project complies with the following Federal laws and regulations:
 - a. Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act
 - b. National Environmental Policy Act
 - c. Endangered Species Act
 - d. Section 404 of the Clean Water Act
 - e. Section 10 of the Rivers and Harbors Act
- 2. Prepare a Hazardous Substance Assessment for the project.
- 3. Provide confirmation of compliance with the above to the Cooperator's Project Officer for implementation activities to begin on the project.
- 4. Assist the Cooperator's Project Officer or Field Manager and the landowner(s), as applicable, in preparing project permit applications as required under local, State, or Federal laws and regulations.
- 5. Retain final approval authority over all agreements under this Cooperative Agreement.

C. Cooperator will:

- 1. Serve as administrator of contracts, services, materials acquisitions, and disbursement of the Service's cost-share for activities relating to project completion.
- 2. Work cooperatively with the Service to carry out this agreement to participate in fish and wildlife conservation activities.
- 3. Receive prior approval from the Service for individual projects. Coordinate with the Service on project design and implementation phases of the project(s).
- 4. Provide landowners with technical assistance in preparing applications required to obtain necessary Federal, State, and local permits relating to the project.
- 5. Coordinate with all project participants, and notify each participant that implementation activities can begin once notification is received from the Partners Program Biologist that all appropriate local, State, and Federal permits and clearances have been obtained.
- 6. Maintain proper books, records, and accounts of all specific project expenditures for the project. (The Service must have the right to review the appropriate documentation to verify project expenditures upon a 30-day notice in writing from the Service.)
- 7. Administer this Cooperative Agreement and any other contracts or services required to successfully complete the project.
