Your organization's application for Federal financial assistance titled "Manzanita Creek Migration Barrier Removal Design" submitted to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service)'s CFDA Program 15.608 is approved. This award is made under the authority of Fish and Wildlife Management Assistance. This award is made based on Service approval of your organization's proposal signed on June 26, 2017, hereby incorporated by reference into this award.

Funds under this award are to be used to prepare concept through draft-final (90%) designs and to complete regulatory permitting to remove the concrete dam on Manzanita Creek, a tributary to the Trinity River near Big Bar, California. This project will restore fish passage to 2.6 miles of habitat for salmon, steelhead, and Pacific lamprey.

Scope of Work and Budget for Manzanita Creek Migration Barrier Removal Design

Manzanita Creek is located in the Big Bar area of the Trinity River and is nearly entirely within the Trinity Alps Wilderness Area and a Research Natural Area. A small concrete dam is located on the stream and is only accessible by foot. This project will design, permit and complete NEPA for the removal of the dam. Manzanita Creek is a steelhead and coho bearing stream with no development upstream of the dam. The project is on National Forest lands and represents a cooperative effort between the Trinity River Management Unit of the Shasta-Trinity National Forest, the Northwest CA Resource Conservation and Development Council (RC&DC), and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's Conservation Partnerships Program.

The project goals are to develop a 90% design for the removal of the Manzanita Creek dam, which is a migration barrier, opening up 2.6 miles of anadromous salmonid habitat, and restoring natural gravel and bedload routing down the creek. The completion of the project design will allow the 5C Program or USFS to determine if they want to proceed with funding and implementation of the project.

The design objectives are to:

- Conduct all necessary specialist reports for completion of Environmental Compliance, including botanical, wildlife, archeological, hydrologic and fisheries reports.
- Identify and evaluate physical constraints associated with excavating and removing the existing dam (including equipment access routes, channel and bank modification and reconstruction associated with dam removal). Identification of physical constraints could likely lead to recommendations for hand/gas powered tools rather than heavy equipment.
- Determine the natural channel gradient throughout the study area
- Determine design channel gradient consistent with CDFG and/or NOAA Fish Passage Guidelines
- Conduct reference reach pebble count and streambed mix analysis to develop recommended bedload mix, and gradient control structure sizing based on the 100-year return interval design flow, bedload and scour
- Determine the final design and approximate construction costs and constraints.

Technical Approach:

Manzanita Creek will be surveyed (thalweg and cross sections) to create a topographic map and guide the design. The desired channel gradient will be based on a reference reach. If necessary, grade structures will be designed. Typical reach segments will be surveyed for use in channel designs. Examination and mapping of bedrock and other grade control features will be done to assess current and natural channel gradients. In addition, design factors will be determined due to the unique situation of construction in the Wilderness Area. The project will have to be completed using on human and animal power. A trail access and upgrade plan will be needed to bring in tools and manage debris. A camp plan will be needed to provide support to crews working on the project, as well. Flow data will be based on USGS Streamstat. Particle sizing will be based on sample reach sampling and regression equations.

Botanical, wetland, wildlife and cultural assessments will be completed as needed to comply with NEPA for the project. Permitting (1600, 401 and 404) and consultation with NMFS will be completed as part of the project.

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Project Location:

The project is located near the town of Big Bar, Trinity County, California on Manzanita Creek, a tributary to the Trinity River; The project will occur about 1 mile (5,260 ft) from the mainstem Trinity River on less than 1 acre of stream corridor along approximately 100 feet of stream.
